DOGS

Dogs need healthy food, clean water and should be fed twice a day.





Daily exercise and training keeps dogs happy and healthy.

Dogs can be shy, playful, scared, friendly, or just plain sleepy!







CATS

Cats need healthy food, clean water and should be fed twice a day.







Cats who live indoors usually live longer than outdoor cats.

Cats can be very shy, especially when meeting new people!

Lots of toys, cat trees and scratching posts help keep cats active and in tip-top shape.

RABBITS

Rabbits eat pellets, fresh timothy hay and need fresh veggies every day!





Rabbits are super smart and social—you can teach them to use a litter box, like a cat!

Always hold a rabbit gently but firmly. Never pick up a rabbit by its ears!

Rabbits love to chew, so be sure to watch them when they're not in a cage!



GUINEA PIGS

Guinea pigs eat pellets, fresh hay and need fresh fruits and veggies every day!





Guinea pigs need regular exercise—but no exercise wheels or balls for them please!

Guinea pigs need vitamin C daily to stay in tip-top shape! Guinea Pigs are curious, social and love to chat!



HAMSTERS

Hamsters eat alfalfa pellets, spinach, lettuce, apples and cauliflower.








Hamsters are nocturnal—they sleep during the day and play at night!

Hamsters don't always get along with other hamsters!





DEGUS

Degus eat guinea pig mix or chinchilla pellets and need fresh hay daily. Never give them fruit or food with sugar!



Degus like to chew on pieces of untreated wood and cardboard rolls to keep their teeth worn down.

> Degus clean themselves by rolling in dust!

Degus are very social and like to live with one of their kind.

Make sure both degus are girls (or are both boys) to keep them from having babies.







GERBILS

Gerbils eat pellets and seed mixes. They like puffed wheat, dried kidney beans, apples, broccoli and carrots as treats!





Gerbils love to dig so make sure their cages have two to three inches of bedding. No sawdust or cedar chips, please!

> Gerbils thump their back legs when they're very excited or nervous!

Gerbils are happiest when they live with a gerbil friend. Be sure to keep boys with boys and girls with girls!



RATS

Rats eat pellets and blocks of rat food. Fresh fruit, vegetables, nuts, seeds and cheese make great treats too!





Rats love to play!
Be sure to give them lots of things to do!

Rats are very smart and can learn to do all kinds of cool tricks! Rats like to live with other rats, but make sure girls live with girls and boys live with boys!



MICE

Mice don't usually like to be held, and because of this, they aren't the best pets for kids, but mice love to play with tunnels and toys!



Mice eat pellets, leafy green veggies and fruit, like apples and bananas!

Two girl mice are more likely to get along than two boy mice!



SUMMER

Hot Dogs Aren't Cool

Dogs can die inside a hot car. It's best to leave them at home on hot days.

AUTUMN



Thanksgiving

Don't feed your pet table scraps. Foods for people can make pets sick!

Keep desserts and candy away from your pet too, along with any wrappers that they could choke on!

Halloween

Don't dress your pet in a costume—most pets don't like it.

Black cats are a symbol of Halloween, but sadly they can be picked-on around this holiday. Keep cats indoors, especially on Halloween night.



WINTER

Walking Tips

Keep your pet indoors on really cold days so they don't get sick. Wrap them in a warm coat when heading outside and keep walks short.

Wipe salt off your dog's paws, legs and stomach after winter walks to keep them clean!





Christmas and Hanukkah

Don't put tinsel on your tree. Swallowing tinsel can make pets very sick.

Keep the cords on your holiday lights tucked away to keep your pet from chewing on them. If you're lighting a candle, keep animals away from any open flames.

SPRING



Wildlife

When out on walks, be sure to leave wildlife alone!

Babies are born in the spring, and if you spot them alone, mom and dad are not usually far away.

Easter

Adopting a rabbit around Easter may seem like a good idea, but they can be a lot of work! Adopt a rabbit only when your family is ready.

Remember to keep Easter chocolate away from your pets to keep them safe!






