Thankfully, you answered her call.



From the President and CEO's Desk


Thank You

Thankfully you came to save him. Because of you, Sully was able to receive the care he needed to fix his jaw and to escape the window well. Best of all, Sully has found his forever home and is living comfortably with his new family.

You Are There for the Animals When They Need You Most

If there's anything the past two years have taught us, it's that it is nearly impossible to predict emergencies and exactly what kind of challenges we will face. Few imagined that Canada would still be feeling the ripples of the public health crisis more than two years after it was declared an emergency. No one predicted that a derecho would tear through Ottawa and leave thousands without power for more than a week. At the OHS, we didn't foresee the explosion of our rabbit population and a drought of foster volunteers.

But, through it all, the animals haven't suffered. We have you and your incredible generosity to thank for that.

Because of you, no animal was ever turned away throughout the public health crisis. You ensured there

were resources available for animals in need and that the OHS never had to close our doors. When May's storm plunged the OHS into darkness, you made sure there was light for animals in need, and you made sure they could continue to safely receive incredible care throughout the emergency. Even as we see a historic number of rabbits in our care and an ongoing drought of available foster homes, you make sure there is always care available for these animals and more.

At the OHS, we dedicate a lot of effort to planning. We make plans for all kinds of emergencies, shortages, and anything else that could affect our capacity to care for animals in need. A common thread among all these plans is that without your support, none of them would be possible.

Thank you for being there, when the animals need you most.

These two amazing heroes held a perennial plant sale to raise funds for Ottawa's animals! Thank you, Ava and Dylan, for your amazing contribution!





Thanks to you, more can be done for animals beyond healing their injuries and providing day-to-day care. With your support, animals with challenging behaviours can receive the care they need to adapt to living in their forever home, and their families can access resources to help manage their animal's behaviour.

Our canine behaviour intervention volunteers are an important part of helping dogs who have challenging behaviours. These volunteers work one-on-one with dogs to provide training that helps the dog adjust to life in the shelter and find their forever family even faster.

Services for Our Community

Because of you, more can be done for our community. You help keep families together and ensure that people have what they need to care for their pets. The OHS is here to shelter any animal whose owner can no longer keep them, but we prefer keeping families together whenever possible. Here are some of the ways you make it happen.

Mobile Spay/Neuter Service and Microchip Clinics

Thanks to you, income-qualified cat owners in Ottawa can access subsidized spay/neuter services for their pets. This helps prevent pet overpopulation and helps address some common behavioural challenges. You also provide subsidized microchip clinics for low-income families. A microchip ensures that if a pet ever becomes lost, they can quickly return home.

Both of these services returned earlier this year and have provided service for hundreds of animals.

Pet Savvy Program


The Pet Savvy Program offers workshops to underserved communities in Ottawa and provides essential pet care tips like proper grooming, how to protect a pet from parasites, what foods are toxic to animals, and more. The program also provides attendees with takeaway resources for pet care and some essential supplies like tick removers, toothbrushes, nail clippers, treats and toys.


Thanks to you, pet care supplies and information are easily available to everyone in our community — bolstering pet health and keeping families together.
