Rabbits are playful, active and curious animals. They need daily enrichment that lets them display their natural behaviours

Some of these natural behaviours include:

Running/ hopping



Burrowing

Foraging

Socializing



Did you know?

Bunnies are most active in the morning and evening, and spend a large portion of the day and night sleeping or resting



There are two types of enrichment that your rabbit needs every day

Environmental Enrichment

Interactive Enrichment

Environmental enrichment means setting up your rabbit's space in a way that lets them display their natural behaviours and improve their quality of life.

Places to explore

Provide your bunny with hiding places and platforms inside their enclosure, and make sure to give them plenty of daily roaming time for mental and physical exercise



Food puzzles



Provide food in a way that encourages your rabbit to forage and work for their food, such as a treat ball, a burrow box or hiding leafy greens around their enclosure

Toys and play

Give your bunny plenty of objects to manipulate and investigate. Rotate your bunny's toy selection daily so they don't get bored



Interactive enrichment means socializing with your bunny and providing active enrichment for their mind and body that improves their quality of life.

Petting and grooming



Daily petting and grooming not only helps socialize your rabbit and keep their coat and nails healthy, it helps strengthen your bond with your bunny best friend!

Clicker training!

Did you know rabbits can be trained? Teach your rabbit a trick, to use the litter box or to walk on a leash and harness while using positive reinforcement



Bunny arts and crafts



Get creative! Have fun with your rabbit while making them a fun toy to play with, or play interactive games that keep them engaged
