Most people know that spaying/neutering pets prevents pet overpopulation, but less known is that spaying/neutering also sets up the pet for a lifetime of good health and prevents certain life-threatening conditions.

We've talked before about pyometra, an infection in the uterus that can be fatal if left untreated, and how spaying can prevent this condition from ever happening.

Now, we're in the middle of kitten season and you are supporting hundreds of kittens who need shelter and care to grow strong and find their new forever homes. One of these little families who you saved is momma Cheyenne and her kittens.

Cheyenne was found lost and alone, and in desperate need of help. She had safely given birth to five kittens, but sadly two had died in her womb and were stuck in her birth canal. Without your life-saving support, Cheyenne and her litter faced a horrible death — but they had you.



Safely at the OHS, Cheyenne received an emergency C-section to save her and her family. With kittens and momma safe, Cheyenne was able to focus on resting and recovering from her surgery, while nursing her kittens and helping them grow and develop.

Now these kittens and their momma are ready to join forever families of their own, and they owe it all to you. Thank you for saving this family and so many more just like them.

From the President and CEO's Desk

What it Means to be Humane

One of the most heart-wrenching things I have witnessed at the OHS was a mother weeping as she hugged her sobbing teen-aged daughter. They were surrendering a pet they could no longer care for. At that moment, I let go of judgment, for good.



We also offer short-term emergency boarding for people in desperate situations. We offer behaviour resources, where an animal's behaviour is jeopardizing the human-animal bond. As much as possible, we look for options other than surrender, although we will always take in the animal, where

doing so is in their best interest.

It's easier to think people surrendering pets don't care about them the way "we" do. This family cared. They cared enough to make the best decision they could for their pet. They put their trust in us. Over the years I have come to understand that most people who bring animals to us don't want to. They simply don't have another option.

Recently, to help people already facing a bad situation, we dropped our surrender fees. We also believe, that this may result in animals coming to us sooner, before their behaviour issue becomes worse, before their medical situation is beyond help.

Sometimes, we're able to avoid surrender of a loved pet. Many owners turn to us in immediate crisis. Where food is a barrier, we can help through our pet food bank. Our mobile spay/neuter program provides a critical service for families who usually wouldn't be able to access a spay/neuter surgery for their pet.

But what if we could do more? What if we could help more people overcome the hardship they were facing, so that they could keep their pet? Where that animal is loved, has a stable home and a family that — at other times — is fully able to support their needs. What would it take?

More and more, we see that being a truly humane and compassionate community means helping at both ends of the leash. But as a community-based organization, we need to know what you think. That's why, later this summer, we will be reaching out to you and the community to talk about what the future holds for the OHS and Ottawa's animals. As an OHS supporter, your voice counts.

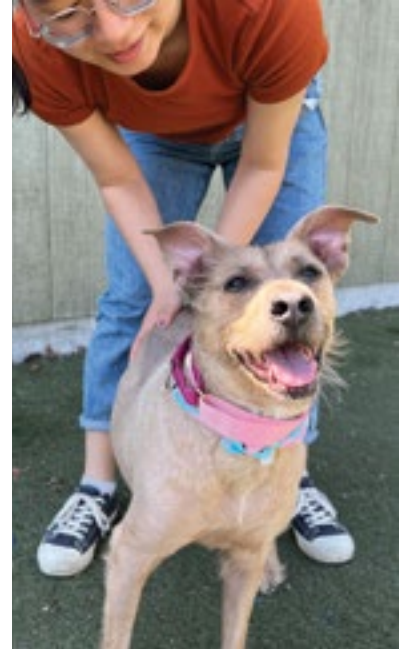

The End of Cosmetic Animal Testing

Your advocacy is making a difference for the animals!

In April, the Canadian government introduced its 2023 federal budget, which included a proposal to ban cosmetic animal testing. If passed, the bill would end testing on animals in Canada, selling cosmetics that rely on animal testing data to establish the product's safety, and false labelling related to testing cosmetics on animals.

More than 40 countries have already banned cosmetic testing on animals, and Canada is poised to make the leap and implement this overdue legislation.

Cosmetic products tested on animals can range from makeup, perfume, lotions, hair products, nail polish, shaving creams, deodorant and more. These products have been tested on animals for decades to gauge the product's



effectiveness and safety for human use at the expense of the animal.

Rabbits, rats, Guinea pigs, and mice in Canada are subject to this cruelty every year. These experiments often cause the animals extreme distress, discomfort and pain.

As someone who cares, you know that despite alternatives being available and in use, many companies still test their products on animals. Many of the alternatives are proven to be more efficient and cost-effective than animal testing.

Canada is moving in the right direction, but now is the most crucial and best time to show your support. Reach out to your MP and let them know that animal testing and cruelty have no place in Canada.

No Pet Too Big or Small

We've told you about the many cats and dogs you've saved. Stories of complex surgeries, miraculous recoveries, and turning around particularly challenging behaviours. You do so much for Ottawa's cats and dogs, and on top of that work, you also save Ottawa's small animals.

Since late 2021, we have had an unprecedented number of rabbits in our care — searching for their forever homes. Some were the result of uncontrolled breeding; others, the real “pandemic pets” that became less desirable as people's lives returned to normal. Thanks to you, each of these bunnies receives the regular, daily care they need to live happy and healthy lives, before we find their forever home.

In addition to ongoing care, rabbits receive a spay/neuter surgery before adoption, helping to prevent rabbit homelessness and overpopulation.

And that's not all you do. Allow us to introduce you to Cream Puff, the world's sweetest and toughest Guinea pig, who has an incredible story. She arrived at the OHS with ovarian cysts, a serious condition that can be fatal if left untreated. Surgery on a Guinea pig is not common and has some risks, which is why we usually don't spay/neuter Guinea pigs before making their adoption matches.

However, thanks to you, many more resources are available to Ottawa's animals, making the impossible possible. Cream Puff received surgery to remove her cysts and made an amazing recovery, and it didn't take this sweetheart long to find her new, loving family.

You make sure that small animals like Cream Puff won't be overlooked, and you make sure that all homeless animals at the OHS receive the love and care they desperately need.

Last year, we introduced our small animal enrichment program. Everyone knows cats and dogs need regular play time to be happy and healthy. Small animals have the same needs and these volunteers help socialize small animals, stimulate their bodies and minds, and help them be more comfortable with being handled.

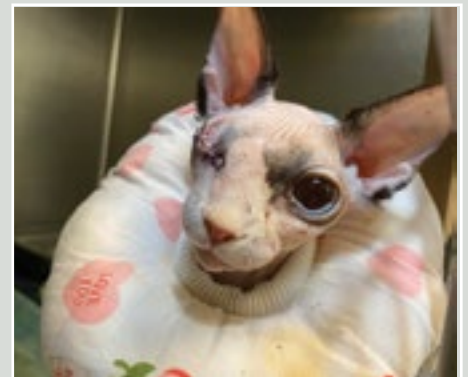

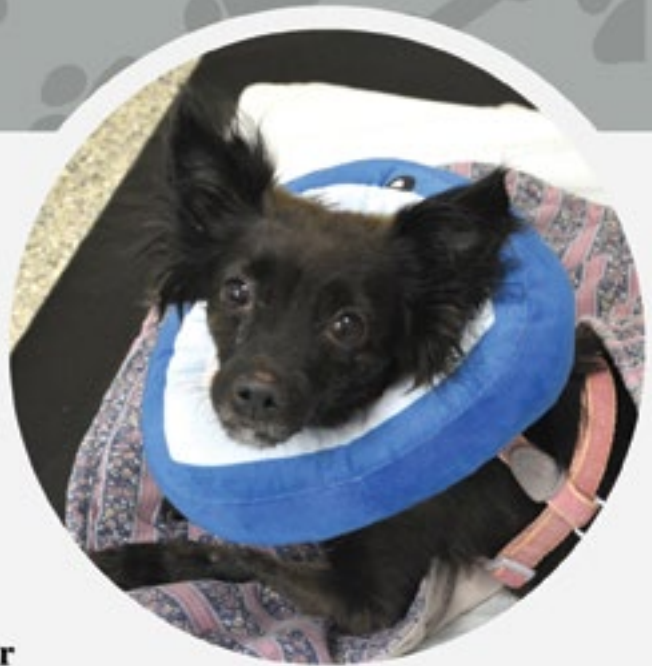
Animals like Dakota are counting on you to provide them with a new start at life and get them into loving forever homes.
